Dear Colleagues,

The AUPO Board has completed its priority lists and begun implementation of the first-ever AUPO strategic planning effort to engage external consultants. Our Program Committee, expertly chaired by James Tsai and comprised of leaders from all council constituencies, has developed an innovative and relevant program. The varied and robust symposia, workshops, panel discussions, roundtables, etc., provide important opportunities for each constituency to gather separately and collectively to network, inform, update, and share best practices. The signature all-day Educating the Educators kick-off program on Wednesday, February 3, remains a must-attend initiative for all things regarding learner development. The two Boot Camps for

New Chairs and Administrators, and the popular Chair Chat round table sessions will also occur on Wednesday afternoon.

In addition to the Presidents' Symposium on Thursday morning, the AUPO/AAO Straatsma Award for Excellence in Resident Education and the Medical Student Educator Awards will be celebrated. Friday morning, the RPB David F. Weeks Outstanding Research Award recipient will be recognized, and we will be impressed yet again by the high caliber of research projects presented during the Resident and Fellow Research Forum. The Councils for Administrators, Medical Student Educators, Program Directors, Research Directors, and Coordinators have planned exciting educational content throughout the entire meeting.

Friday evening, we will cap off with the 60th anniversary gala reception and banquet with an entertaining and informative video featuring AUPO leaders. This will be a memorable celebration for all!

INTRODUCTION AND PURPOSE

AUPO champions an inclusive academic ophthalmology community to promote and advocate for excellence and equity in ophthalmic education, professional development, research, and clinical care.

The AUPO code of conduct applies to all AUPO members and participants in AUPO events and meetings.

GENERAL PRINCIPLES

AUPO members and participants are committed to acting honestly, truthfully, and with integrity in all our actions and dealings. We commit to treating each other with dignity, courtesy, and respect. We commit to listening to each other while keeping our hearts and minds open, and to speaking thoughtfully and with respect for our listeners.

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS

AUPO members and participants commit to maintaining competence in our profession, including the following, where applicable: clinical and surgical competency, research knowledge, educational and mentoring skills, and administrative expertise.

AUPO members and participants commit to improving the accountability, transparency, ethical conduct, and effectiveness of academic ophthalmology.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST

AUPO members and participants acknowledge the potential for conflict of interest, and the need for this to be recognized and disclosed, as well as the need for appropriate steps to be taken to manage any identified conflicts as outlined in AUPO's conflict of interest policy.

AUPO members and participants commit to serving the AUPO membership and the broader academic ophthalmology community with impartiality, transparency, and fairness.

COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS AND REGULATIONS

AUPO members and participants agree to abide by all applicable laws and regulations.

In addition, AUPO members and participants agree to bring to the attention of the AUPO Board of Trustees any decisions or actions that they identify as unethical or illegal. Further, they commit to informing the Board of the possible results of these decisions or actions.

CONFIDENTIALITY

Officers, trustees, and committee members, together comprising "AUPO leadership" agree to serve AUPO with loyalty and respect for confidentiality, avoiding conflicts of interest and activities that may be perceived as taking personal advantage to the possible detriment of the AUPO or its members.

AUPO leadership agrees to respect and protect confidential information.

PROFESSIONAL RELATIONSHIPS

AUPO is committed to nurturing members and participants in their professional development, as they work to become independent and accomplished contributors to academic ophthalmology. AUPO is committed to developing an inclusive community in which members engage, collaborate, and develop productive professional relationships.

AUPO expects members and participants to develop professional relationships and to achieve resolution of actual or apparent conflicts in a professional and respectful manner.

AVOIDING DISCRIMINATION AND HARASSMENT

AUPO members and participants commit to treating every individual with dignity and respect. Further, they commit to engaging others in good faith and assuming good intent.

Harassment and discrimination are not tolerated in any activity or interaction among AUPO members and participants. Members and participants who witness such behavior agree to bring the incident to the attention of the AUPO Board of Trustees for further review and action.

REPORTING VIOLATIONS AND CONSEQUENCES

AUPO members and participants are encouraged to report violations of the Code of Conduct to the AUPO Board of Trustees. Where the violation involves a trustee, the report will be made to the Executive Vice President (EVP). If the violation involves the EVP, then the report will be made to the President. In the event that the EVP and the President are involved, the report will be made to the AUPO Client Services Manager who will convene an ad hoc committee of appropriate individuals. Reporters acting in good faith will be protected, and the information managed with sensitivity, and in accordance with the AUPO Policy Statement on "Governance: whistleblower protection." Retaliatory behavior will not be tolerated.

The AUPO will review complaints and determine necessary action, up to and including loss of membership. These disciplinary actions will be applied in a fair and consistent manner.

REVIEW AND UPDATE PROCESS

AUPO leadership commits to reviewing and updating the code of conduct at a minimum every three years, utilizing a process that solicits feedback from members. The AUPO Code of Conduct will be posted on the AUPO website. Approved July 23, 2024.

Straatsma Award for Excellence in Resident Education

The Straatsma Award was established through funding from the American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO), the Association of University Professors of Ophthalmology (AUPO), and private funds, to recognize and celebrate an outstanding Program Director in ophthalmology.

Dr. Jennifer Luiz Lindsey, is a distinguished ophthalmologist and educator whose career spans over two decades of clinical excellence, academic leadership, and national advocacy. A graduate of Rice University (BA, Biochemistry, cum laude) and Baylor College of Medicine

(MD), Dr. Lindsey completed her ophthalmology residency at Baylor and later earned an Executive MBA with honors from Vanderbilt University's Owen Graduate School of Management, where she was inducted into the Beta Sigma Gamma Honor Society. She is a 2020 graduate of the American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO) Leadership Development Program.

Dr. Lindsey's academic career began at Baylor and flourished at Vanderbilt University Medical Center, where she served as Assistant and then Associate Professor of Ophthalmology and Visual Sciences. She held numerous leadership roles, including Residency Program Director and the James H. Elliott Endowed Director of Resident Education. Her tenure at Vanderbilt and the Veterans Health Administration's Tennessee Valley Healthcare System was marked by transformative contributions to surgical education and clinical innovation, including the development of a comprehensive online learning management system for ophthalmology residents.

In 2024, Dr. Lindsey joined Mass Eye and Ear and Harvard Medical School as a faculty member and was named Vice Chair for Education and Director of Resident Education at Harvard Ophthalmology, where she continues to shape the future of ophthalmic training. In 2025, she was named the Diane and Albert Kaneb Chair in Ophthalmology. She practices comprehensive ophthalmology, with an emphasis on cataract surgery, and is an active clinical and surgical teacher for Harvard medical students and ophthalmology residents.

Nationally, Dr. Lindsey has held leadership positions in the Association of Veterans Affairs Ophthalmologists (past President), the AAO Secretariat for State Affairs, and the Association of University Professors of Ophthalmology (AUPO), where she is the current President of the Program Directors Council. Her scholarly work includes numerous peer-reviewed publications on surgical education, health policy, and clinical outcomes, and she has been recognized with multiple awards for teaching excellence and leadership, including the AAO Achievement and Secretariat Awards.

Dr. Lindsey's career is defined by her commitment to patient care, educational innovation, advocacy, and mentorship. Her work continues to influence ophthalmology training programs nationwide, advancing excellence and innovation in medical education.

NISHA CHADHA, MD

Excellence in Medical Student Education Award

The Award for Excellence in Medical Student Education provides national recognition for an outstanding medical student educator. It was established through funding from the Association of University Professors of Ophthalmology (AUPO) and the American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO).

Dr. Chadha is an Associate Professor at the New York Eye and Ear Infirmary of Mount Sinai/ Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai (ISMMS), where she has served as faculty since 2015. She completed her ophthalmology residency at The George Washington University, followed by a glaucoma fellowship at the Yale Eye Center. Since 2017, she has served as the Director of Medical Student Education (DMSE) in Ophthalmology and was elected to the DMSE Council in 2022.

In addition to being actively involved in medical education across all levels of training, Dr. Chadha has a strong interest in curricular innovation and educational scholarship. In 2020, she co-founded “20/20 SIM” (2020SIM.com), a free, online, case-based ophthalmology learning tool designed for healthcare providers. This resource has been formally integrated into the ISMMS undergraduate medical curriculum, enhancing ophthalmology education at the medical student level.

Beyond her leadership in ophthalmology, Dr. Chadha has made notable contributions to undergraduate medical education (UME). She served as a course leader in the school’s clinical skills course from 2019 to 2024, where she developed and implemented a range of innovative curricula in ophthalmology and general medical education. In 2024, she was appointed the inaugural Director of a school-wide shadowing program within the Office of Curricular Affairs.

A strong advocate for gender equity in medicine, Dr. Chadha served as President of the Women in Ophthalmology New York City Group (WIO NYC) from 2021 to 2024. Her leadership and contributions were recognized nationally with the 2024 Emerging Leader Award from Women in Ophthalmology. She was also inducted as a fellow of the ISMMS’s Institute for Medical Education in 2020, and has received multiple nominations for institution-wide Excellence in Teaching Awards.

Dr. Chadha’s work reflects a deep commitment to educational excellence, innovation, and leadership in academic medicine. Through her multifaceted roles, she continues to advance the future of ophthalmology and medical education.



ERIC PIERCE, MD, PHD

RPB David F. Weeks Award for Outstanding Vision Research

The RPB David F. Weeks Award for Outstanding Vision Research has been established through the generosity of Research to Prevent Blindness (RPB), an anonymous donor, and the Association of University Professors of Ophthalmology (AUPO), to annually recognize and celebrate an outstanding ophthalmic vision scientist whose research has made meaningful contributions to the understanding and/or treatment of potentially blinding eye disease.

Dr. Pierce is the Chatlos Professor of Ophthalmology at Harvard Medical School, and the founding Director of the Ocular Genomics Institute (OGI) at Mass Eye and Ear. Dr. Pierce received his AB in Biochemistry from Dartmouth College, his PhD in Biochemistry from the

University of Wisconsin-Madison, and his MD from Harvard Medical School. He did his residency in Ophthalmology at Harvard and fellowship in Pediatric Ophthalmology at Children’s Hospital, Boston, where he also took his first faculty position. He was then recruited to the Department of Ophthalmology at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine, where he was promoted to Associate Professor with tenure. He returned to Harvard in 2011 to establish the OGI. The mission of the OGI is to translate the promise of precision medicine into clinical care for patients with inherited eye diseases. Dr. Pierce’s research program is focused on improving our understanding of the genetic causality of inherited retinal degenerations (IRDs) and developing genetically informed therapies for these disorders. His work has led to the identification of several IRD disease genes, helped highlight the importance of non-coding variants in IRDs, and supported clinical translation of genetic therapies for several genetic forms of retinal degeneration. Dr. Pierce has been an investigator for multiple first-in-human clinical trials of genetic therapies for IRDs and is the senior PI for the Brilliance trial of in vivo genome editing for the treatment of CEP290-associated retinal degeneration. Dr. Pierce’s research program has been funded by the NIH since 1994. He has also received support from the Foundation Fighting Blindness and Research to Prevent Blindness, among other foundations. Dr. Pierce received an Alcon Research Award, an RPB Stein Innovation Award, and the Proctor Medal from ARVO. He served on the National Advisory Eye Council, as Chair of the Pathophysiology of Eye Disease 1 (PED1) study section of the NIH, and was the Chair of the Scientific Advisory Board for the Foundation Fighting Blindness for 10 years.

Resident & Fellow Research Forum Awards

AUPO and Research to Prevent Blindness established the Resident and Fellow Research Forum to acknowledge the importance of research in ophthalmic education. The Forum is intended to encourage the most promising house officers to pursue a career in academic ophthalmology and vision research. Following are the 2026 awardees:



BENTON CHUTER, MD, MS

BENTON CHUTER, MD, MS is a pre-residency glaucoma research fellow at the Hamilton Eye Institute (HEI) of the University of Tennessee Health Science Center. He grew up in the San Francisco Bay Area and pursued his undergraduate and master's degrees at Stanford University, studying biology and mechanical engineering while also racing in the top eight for Stanford's varsity rowing team. After working as a consultant in medical device design, he completed his medical degree at the University of California San Diego. Now at HEI, he brings over a decade of research experience and expertise in engineering, medicine, and AI. Leading a team in Dr. Monica Jablonski's lab, he develops and applies novel deep learning-based tools to assess measures of optic nerve health. Benton is one of the first to use deep learning to quantify the effect of a pharmaceutical agent on optic nerve morphology. Also a proud father, he considers his son to be his greatest invention yet. As an aspiring ophthalmologist, Benton hopes to continue integrating his academic, engineering, and clinical interests to improve and broaden access to ophthalmologic care.



RAHUL DHODAPKAR, MD

RAHUL DHODAPKAR, MD is a dedicated resident physician in ophthalmology at the University of Southern California with expertise in complex computational modeling of molecular genetics and diagnostic imaging data. As a former core software engineer at MongoDB (a leading database technology), I also have expertise in the management and manipulation of large datasets. My previous work includes developing new approaches for the analysis of single-cell data based on large language models with a focus on cross-species applications (e.g. determining the applicability of insights derived in non-human model systems to human vision) as well as perturbation prediction (e.g. predicting the effect of a new drug or genetic manipulation in a never-before-seen context in silico). I have also authored work applying state-of-the-art computer vision techniques to perform automated quality control of OCTA images. Aligned with my goal of becoming a physician-scientist in our field, I remain focused on developing new techniques for the application of artificial intelligence to improve both the clinical practice of ophthalmology and the basic science that drives our understanding of ophthalmic pathology. I am excited to present our work on automated measurement of strabismus using computer vision techniques at the research forum this year.



BLAKE HAUSER, MD, PHD

BLAKE HAUSER, MD, PHD, is currently a PGY-2 resident in ophthalmology at Mass Eye and Ear. She graduated from the Health Sciences and Technology track at Harvard Medical School while also earning a PhD in Biophysics through the Harvard/MIT MD-PhD program. Her doctoral work focused on protein engineering and structural virology, and this was funded by an NIH F30 grant award. She has a longstanding research interest in understanding the molecular basis of human disease, which she first pursued as a Morehead-Cain Scholar at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and later as a Churchill Scholar at the University of Cambridge. Blake has published over 70 peer-reviewed papers and earned multiple awards including the Dr. John D. and Gretchen H. Bullock Ophthalmology Award and the Soma Weiss Award for Excellence in Research from Harvard Medical School. Currently, she works with Elizabeth Rossin, MD, PhD, on leveraging analysis of protein structures to obtain increased insight into the genetic basis of inherited retinal diseases, in parallel with her clinical training in ophthalmology. She aspires to a career as an academic surgeon-scientist, helping to preserve patients' vision while simultaneously advancing scientific understanding of vision-threatening processes.



VINCENT (RUNZHE) XU

VINCENT (RUNZHE) XU is a second-year MD/PhD student at UT Southwestern. He grew up in Nanjing, China, and attended UCLA for college, where he graduated summa cum laude with BSc in Biochemistry and Neuroscience. During and after his undergraduate studies, he conducted neuroscience research under the mentorship of HHMI Investigator Dr. Larry Zipursky. His work elucidated novel roles of vision in regulating mammalian visual cortex development by leveraging high-throughput single-cell sequencing and spatial transcriptomics. His research has led to multiple publications in high-impact journals, including Cell, Nature, and Cancer Cell, as well as a first-author publication in PNAS. With a growing interest in vision science and the emerging field of cancer neuroscience, he subsequently joined the UT Southwestern MSTP program and began research under the mentorship of Dr. William J. Harbour to investigate the biological underpinnings of intraocular tumorigenesis. His recent work focuses on dissecting the molecular heterogeneity of human retinoblastoma and identifying conserved transcriptional programs associated with tumor malignancy and treatment response by integrating high-throughput omics and bioinformatics. Vincent plans to pursue residency training in ophthalmology and aspires to become a physician-scientist who bridges clinical care and laboratory research to develop new treatments for sight-threatening diseases.

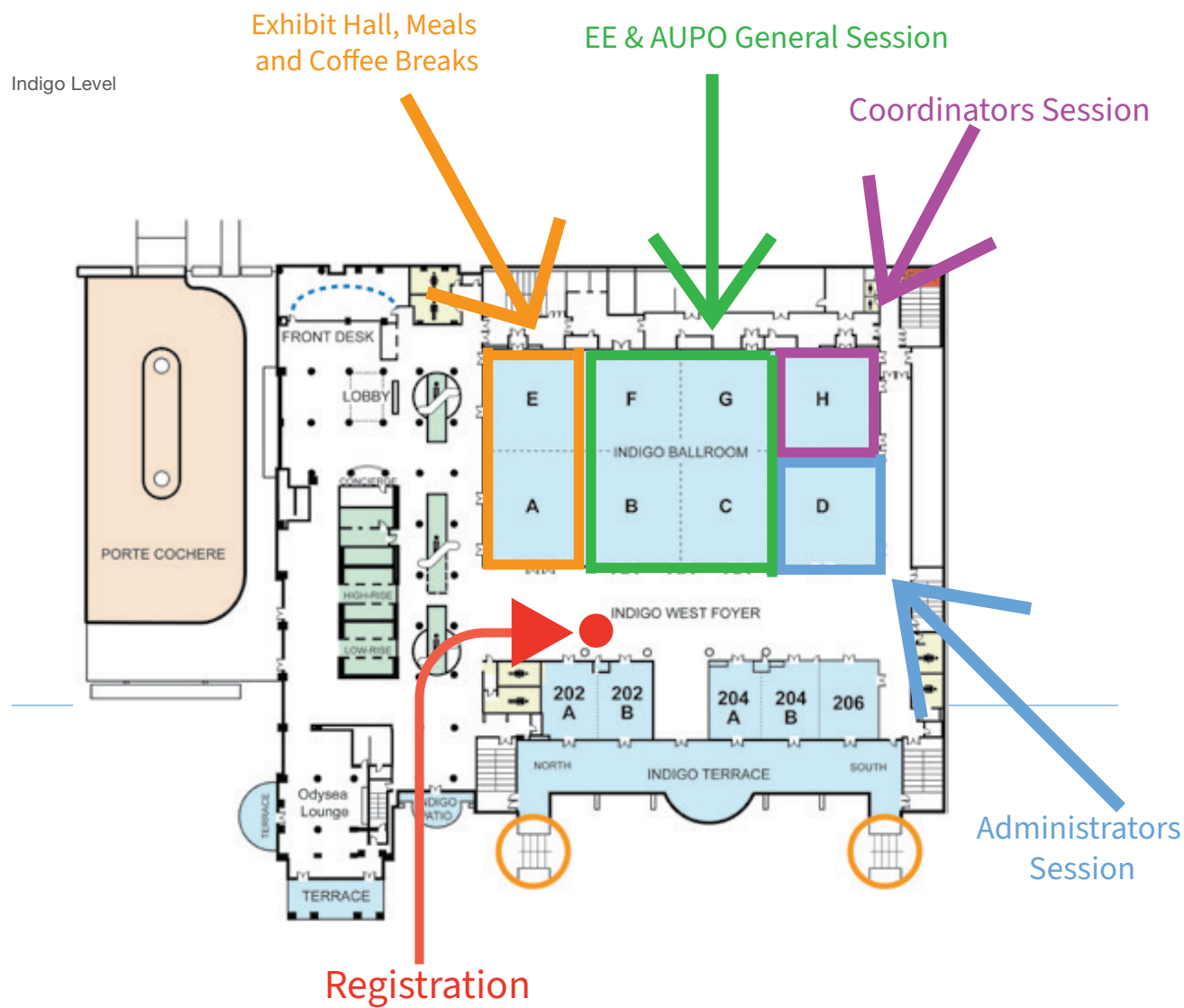


Resort Map
